## Greek Mythology - #1 Definitions/History/Beliefs Notes

Myth	An ancient, anonymous story about supernatural gods and heroes and explain many things that occur in nature.
Ancient	Extremely old
Anonymous	Author/creator unknown
Supernatural	Beyond humanly possible
Deity	Gods which never die and have super powers.  Example – Zeus, Apollo, Cyclops
Demi-god - Hero	One parent is a god; has super powers.  Example- Hercules
History of Greek Myths	Greece & Asia Minor (about 2,000 years ago)
Oral Versions (word of mouth)	As early as 1800 B.C.
Bard	Poets, early storytellers
Written Versions	700 B.C.
Main Sources:	
Hesiod	700 B.C.  Wrote <i>The Theogony</i> (inspired by the muses) poem about the creation of the gods

Homer	1100 B.C. to 700 B.C. (perhaps even earlier)
	Wrote <i>The Iliad</i> and <i>The Odyssey;</i> epic poems
Epic	Long narrative poem with a hero who performs heroic deeds.
Ages of Mankind	As told by Hesiod
1. Golden	Rule of the Titans
2. Silver	<b>Rule of Zeus (Olympians)</b> mankind is destroyed since they do not honor the gods.
3. Bronze	Rule of Zeus (Olympians) Mankind recreated and were warlike, mankind dies in a flood (Deucalion myth)
4. Iron Age of Heroes	Hercules, Perseus, Theseus
5. Iron Age- Present Day	
Beliefs –	Cultural Understanding of the Universe
1. Earth (see link of Hesiod's map)	Spherical with Greece in the middle and the highest point to be Mt. Olympus. The center of the universe.
2. Mt. Olympus	Home of the Olympian gods in the realm above Mt. Olympus.
3. Underworld	Underneath the earth and the realm of the dead; not to be feared.
4. Oceanus (Titan)	River encircling the earth

5. River Styx (Titan)	River that divided the land of the living from the land of the dead. One could only enter by paying the ferryman, Charon, with a coin under the tongue. Without payment a soul is lost for 100 years in the river of the dead.
Charon (deity) VERSIONS	Ferryman who will take souls across the river with payment which was a coin under the tongue. Without payment, a soul is lost for 100 years.
Elysian Fields	Place similar to heaven and reserved for the most-respected mortals and heroes.
Immortal	Deities; gods who can <b>never</b> die but can feel pain.
	<ul> <li>As gods, they do not follow mortal man's laws and morals. As a god, one could marry his sister.</li> </ul>
Prophetic (Foresee)	Some gods were prophetic and could see into the future.
Oracles	Help man communicate with the gods. First were temples and later priests. Where the priest was housed became the oracle or temple.
